Interviews


n = 12 psychology stakeholders: practitioners, leaders, interest group and peak body representatives

Survey

- n = 469 AHPRA registered psychologists
- •Demographic characteristics
- Practice details
- •Characteristics of clients
- •Personal and professional impact of bushfires, COVID-19, and other disasters
- •Responses to demands of disasters
- •Gaps and needs for responding to future disasters



Weather Disaster Experiences






Personal Mental Health Impact
