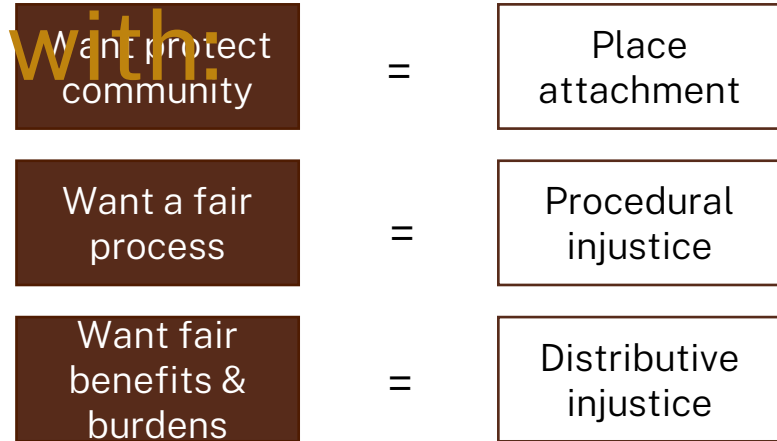

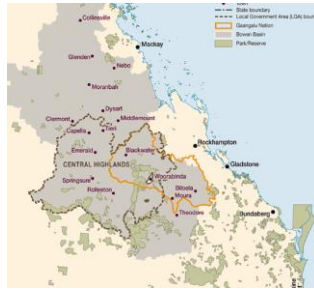

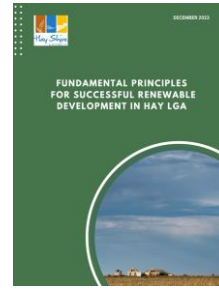

“She characterised the scepticism the community feels as ‘why are all these industries here profiting off of us, destroying our environment, and we’re getting absolutely nothing in return?’ [Gladstone]

“**Avoiding a boom/bust cycle** for the community – impacting housing affordability and availability, services and inflationary pressures...” [Hay]





A recent past of narratives portraying the energy transition as being driven by outsiders and against the interests of regional communities

The coal and gas industry:

[Framed the energy transition] “as being driven by “the “radical” agendas of environmentalists”

“emphasised a rhetoric of regional development and job creation... linking the interests and identities of regional communities with the industry”

# Vital transitions involve trusted people with local legitimacy
